# **DANISH WHITEWORK WORKSHOP**

On Sunday 2nd June a few brave souls joined together in The Scout Hut adjoining St George's Church, Oakdale, to learn how to create a piece of Danish Whitework. The workshop was led by Anna Winter, who had brought many amazing examples for us to peruse (and dream of achieving!). Anna provided us with all the materials we would need to make a Whitework Coaster.

We began by sewing in guide threads, starting at the centre of the linen fabric and carefully making a running stitch over and under two threads at a time, marking groups of ten threads with a side stitch. This was when we got our stronger specs out! Once we had marked a quarter of the fabric, it was time to start in earnest.71 threads down from the centre (see now the need for the guide threads?) we began making a row of satin stitch over 3 threads – all the way to the 58th thread where we began making and turning the corner before continuing the satin stitch to make quarter of a square. Of course, we should have done the whole square but in the time available we wouldn't then have time to learn the other stitches. After beginning the first part of Double Sling Stitch we cut two vertical threads (bit scary!) then carefully pulled out those threads to the corner. Then we finished the double sling stitch which created a pretty hole effect round the pulled threads. We also learnt to make a picot edge and in our packs were detailed instructions to complete the coaster in our own time – with more of the same stitches plus a few more new ones.



Everyone had an enjoyable day, and although different amounts were achieved, I believe all found it an interesting and creative day. Anna was an excellent teacher. We were very ably taught throughout the day, with lots of one-to-one assistance. Coffee and even biscuits and cakes were on hand to enable and refresh our counting abilities. A big thank



you to Poole Bobbin Lace Circle for organising the workshop, and especially to Anna Winter for leading it.

# **GENERAL DATA PROTECTION REGULATION (GDPR)**

PBLC has taken the following steps to ensure that it is GDPR compliant. The Committee has agreed that this GDPR information below will be published annually in the July Newsletter at the time that members renew their subscription. Each year when membership is renewed, PBLC collects the following data for each member – name, address, email address and telephone number. The membership renewal forms containing this data are held by the Membership Secretary and the data is transferred to a spreadsheet to which only current members of the Committee have access. They hold this data on their computers which are password protected. The data is renewed annually and kept only for the duration of membership. The data will only be used for the purposes of PBLC and its Committee and will not be used for any other purpose or disclosed to any third party for any reason. For example it is used only to inform members of events, last minute changes to the programme, sending out the Newsletter to those who have requested it by email and for emergency uses. When members are emailed PBLC uses the BCC facility so that no one has access to anyone else's email address. Each year, on the membership renewal form, members are asked to sign to consent to PBLC holding their data on a data base. If at any time a member wishes to withdraw his/her consent for PBLC to hold data then the current Membership Secretary should be contacted. In Addition – Please remember that if the Committee members agree to their personal details being on the new Programme Card then these must not, under any circumstances, be given to a third party. Anyone may contact PBLC via the website 'Contacts' page using the generic email address provided.
